## What's in the pack?

We'd love children to understand a little more about how life is for families with children with a life-limiting condition, so we have interviewed Izzy. Izzy explains why she has missed so much school, what exactly the kidneys do to keep a person healthy, and why disabilities can be hidden. Izzy's story is on page 3 & 4.

We've also explained why we're called Jessie May (p2) and how you could help, if you choose to support us (p5 and 6).

We're sending this pack to schools in the area in which we provide care - Bristol, South Gloucestershire, North Somerset. Bath and North East Somerset and Swindon and Wiltshire – because we need both your understanding and your help.

Many of the children we care for are invisible because it's such a challenge for their parents and carers to get them out of the house, except to go to hospital appointments. Some, like Izzy, are more mobile but they have invisible disabilities, so giving them support and understanding is really important.

And of course, we'd love you to get on board and help us raise the funds we rely on to continue to give our care to the children and families in our community who need it most. Less than 20% of our funding is statutory - the rest comes from generous donors like you. If you are able to fundraise for us. we'd be so grateful for your support.

## Who was Jessica May?

## Our charity was started by a family. It serves families. And continues to be shaped by families.

**Chris and Philippa Purrington knew** when their baby daughter, Jessica May, was born that they wouldn't have her for very long. She had a genetic condition known as severe Spinal Muscular Atrophy, which meant that she wouldn't see her first birthday.

On a family visit to Bristol, she was admitted to hospital, and Chris and Philippa were shocked to find that the support they received at home in High Wycombe wasn't available to families in Bristol and the surrounding area.

Jessica May died peacefully at home in her father's arms, in privacy and with dignity, surrounded by the people who loved her most.

The Purringtons decided to do everything they could to make sure that other children with conditions like Jessica May's had the same

support and care in their lifetimes as their daughter had.

Jessie May was established in 1996, and provides specialist nursing care for children with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions in their own homes. We provide end of life care and bereavement support, as well as vital respite and emotional support to the children, their siblings and their parents and carers. Our work allows families to make the most of the precious time they have together, making treasured family memories and letting children be children, if only for a short while.

## **Meet Izzy**

## Izzy is eight. She's in Year 3.

Like a lot of children, her school life was disrupted by the pandemic. But unlike a lot of children, Izzy's education has also been disrupted by her stays in hospital.

Izzy was born with kidneys that didn't work properly. The kidneys regulate the whole body. They filter out toxins, control blood chemistry, regulate hormones for bone health, and produce red blood cells. Without working kidneys, the person dies.

Hours after she was born, Izzy's parents had a big decision to make. She was so tiny, and she needed so much treatment to survive – and even then, there were no guarantees. So, should they just allow her to die comfortably and peacefully?

But even though she was very small, Izzy already had a big personality. Despite the challenges, her mum and dad, Emma and Neil, decided to give her the best chance of life they possibly could.

They didn't have many choices. Dialysis, which cleans the blood when the kidneys aren't working, is temporary. Even a kidney transplant, in which Izzy would get a kidney from a donor, isn't a cure. It usually lasts between ten and twenty years, but it's the best way for a person to live a normal life. Until she had her transplant, Izzy couldn't walk.

Because Izzy spent most of the first three years of her life in hospital, she started school a year later than most children. She needed to catch up on being a preschooler before she joined a reception class.

These days, she loves school and hates missing it for hospital appointments. In an average year she has 25 to 30 hospital appointments not including any unexpected hospital admissions. She takes medicine every day and sees her doctors at least every six weeks for a blood test and for her health to be checked.

Izzy can do most of what her friends can do and she loves being in school shows, reading books, writing stories and playing with her girlfriends. Because she looks just like any other child, sometimes when Emma and Neil park in a disabled space, people get cross because they can't see that Izzy has a disability.

Since she was first brought home from hospital as a baby, Izzy has been looked after by Jessie May nurses. For a long time, she had to be fed through a tube, and she couldn't walk, so caring for her while setting up the machine to keep her alive kept Emma and Neil very busy. They really needed the help of nurses Steve and Charlotte to help care for Izzy, as well as doing some of the things you like to do, like trips out, playing and reading stories, with her. Steve and Charlotte were there to give Emma and Neil a much-needed break, even if it was just a chat about the stress and lack of sleep.

Kidney disease isn't the only medical challenge Izzy faces. The Jessie May nurses are still there for her, Emma and Neil, and Izzy's little brother Sebby, who is six. By helping with Izzy's medical care and supporting the whole family when life is really stressful, they make a real difference.

Could you make a difference to children like Izzy too?

## And if those don't float your boat;-

### **Book project**

Why not encourage the children to write their own book, to sell to family and community members? You could produce a storybook or cookbook, including some of their family recipes. This would be a great project to develop artistic and writing skills.

### School fair

Do any of the children and their families have any unwanted items they would like to sell, such as old books or toys? It's a fab way to raise money and stay green by recycling and repurposing!

### Quiz night

A great opportunity to get parents, teachers and pupils together in a fun environment. Test your general knowledge and raise some funds for a great cause. You could even hold a raffle on the same night.

## This is how your fundraising helps

**£60** pays for a whole hour for a Jessie May nurse to help a family and care for a child

**£100** pays for specialist travel to help families come along to our events, to make memories that will last a lifetime

**£300** pays for a portable toilet - essential for Jessie May children - making events spaces accessible to them

**£450** pays for a nurse for a whole day

### Health & safety tips

You should carry out a risk assessment to ensure you have properly addressed any hazards at your fundraising event; we can provide a template to help.

Make sure you have first aid cover and you inform the local police if your event is in a public area. Always get copies of insurance and certificates from any suppliers.

Please make sure that you refer to latest event guidance for England, Scotlad, Wales and Northern Ireland to help you in planning for your safe and successful fundrasiing.

## Raffles

Books of raffle tickets are available to stationers: rules state the raffle should be drawn on the same day that you sell the tickets and each ticket should not exceed £2. If your raffle lasts longer that 24 hourse there are strict rules that apply. Call us for more guidnance.

### Sponsor forms

When completed, your sponsorship form will contain lots of personal information, so please keep it safe before you send it to us, and avoid leaving it on public display.
